Weekly Vocabulary

You will need to know the definitions of these words but also be able to identify specific examples of each and create your own examples as well. We will be working on these in class each day, but be prepared for a vocabulary test on Thursday.

- 1. Sensory Language The author uses sensory words to help the reader see, feel, touch, smell, hear and taste what is being described.
- 2. Figurative Language when you use a word or phrase that does not have its normal every day, literal meaning
- 3. Onomatopoeia The use of a word to describe or imitate a natural sound or the sound made by an object or an action. Example: snap crackle pop
- 4. Simile A simile uses the words "like" or "as" to compare one object or idea with another to suggest they are alike. Example: busy as a bee
- 5. Metaphor The metaphor states a fact or draws a verbal picture by the use of comparison. A simile would say you are like something; a metaphor is more positive it says you are something. Example: You are what you eat.
- 6. Alliteration The repetition of the same initial letter, sound, or group of sounds in a series of words. Alliteration includes tongue twisters. Example: She sells seashells by the seashore.
- 7. Personification A figure of speech in which human characteristics are given to an animal or an object. Example: My teddy bear gave me a hug.
- 8. Hyperbole An exaggeration that is so dramatic that no one would believe the statement is true. Tall tales are hyperboles. Example: He was so hungry, he ate that whole cornfield for lunch, stalks and all.
- 9. Idiom Idioms are word combinations that have a different figurative meaning than the literal meanings of each word or phrase. Example: The cat's got my tongue.
